

# A land of diversity

Africa is the world's second-largest and second-most populous continent, after Asia in both cases. At about 30.3 million km2 (11.7 million square miles) including adjacent islands, it covers 6% of Earth's total surface area and 20% of its land area With 1.3 billion people as of 2018, it accounts for about 16% of the world's human population. Africa's population is the youngest amongst all the continents; the median age in 2012 was 19.7, when the worldwide median age was 30.4. Despite a wide range of natural resources, Africa is the least wealthy continent per capita, in part due to geographic impediments, legacies of European colonization in Africa and the Cold War, predatory/neo-colonialistic activities by Western nations and China, and undemocratic rule and deleterious policies. Despite this low concentration of wealth, recent economic expansion and the large and young population make Africa an important economic market in the broader global context.

The continent is surrounded by the Mediterranean Sea to the north, the Isthmus of Suez and the Red Sea to the northeast, the Indian Ocean to the southeast and the Atlantic Ocean to the west.

The continent includes Madagascar and various archipelagos. It contains 54 fully recognised sovereign states (countries), eight territories and two de facto independent states with limited or no recognition. Algeria is Africa's largest country by area, and Nigeria is its largest by population. African nations cooperate through the establishment of the African Union, which is headquartered in Addis Ababa.





Africa straddles the equator and the prime meridian making it the only continent in the world to be situated in all four cardinal hemispheres. It is the only continent to stretch from the northern temperate to southern temperate zones.

The majority of the continent and its countries are in the Northern Hemisphere, with a substantial portion and number of countries in the Southern Hemisphere. Most of the continent lies in the tropics, except for a large part of Western Sahara, Algeria, Libya and Egypt, the northern tip of Mauritania, the entire territories of Morocco, Ceuta, Melilla and Tunisia which in turn are located above the tropic of Cancer, in the northern temperate zone. In the other extreme of the continent, southern Namibia, southern Botswana, great parts of South

Africa, the entire territories of Lesotho and Eswatini and the southern tips of Mozambique and Madagascar are located below the tropic of Capricorn, in the southern temperate zone.

Africa is home to much biodiversity; it is the continent with the largest number of megafauna species, as it was least affected by the extinction of the Pleistocene megafauna. However, Africa also is heavily affected by a wide range of environmental issues, including desertification, deforestation, water scarcity, and other issues. These entrenched environmental concerns are expected to worsen as climate change impacts Africa. The UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has identified Africa as the continent most vulnerable to climate change.









The history of Africa is long, complex, and has often been under-appreciated by the global historical community. Africa, particularly Eastern Africa, is widely accepted as the place of origin of humans and the Hominidae clade (great apes). The earliest hominids and their ancestors have been dated to around 7 million years ago, including Sahelanthropus tchadensis, Australopithecus africanus, A. afarensis, Homo erectus, H. habilis and H. ergaster— the earliest Homo sapiens (modern human) remains, found in Ethiopia, South Africa, and Morocco, date to circa 200,000, 259,000, and 300,000 years ago respectively, and Homo sapiens is believed to have originated in Africa around 350,000–260,000 years ago.

Early human civilizations, such as Ancient Egypt and Carthage emerged in North Africa. Following a subsequent long and complex history of civilizations, migration and trade, Africa hosts a large diversity of ethnicities, cultures and languages. The last 400 years have witnessed an increasing European influence on the continent. Starting in the 16th century, this was driven by trade, including the Trans-Atlantic slave trade, which created large African diaspora populations in the Americas. In the late 19th century, European countries colonized almost all of Africa, extracting resources from the continent and exploiting local communities; most present states in Africa emerged from a process of decolonisation in the 20th century.

# Etymology

Afri was a Latin name used to refer to the inhabitants of then-known northern Africa to the west of the Nile river, and in its widest sense referred to all lands south of the Mediterranean (Ancient Libya). This name seems to have originally referred to a native Libyan tribe, an ancestor of modern Berbers; see Terence for discussion. The name had usually been connected with the Phoenician word afar meaning "dust", but a 1981 hypothesis has asserted that it stems from the Berber word ifri (plural ifran) meaning "cave", in reference to cave dwellers. The same words may be found in the name of the Banu Ifran from Algeria and Tripolitania, a Berber tribe originally from Yafran (also known as Ifrane) in northwestern Libya, as well as the city of Ifrane in Morocco.

Under Roman rule, Carthage became the capital of the province it then named Africa Proconsularis, following its defeat of the Carthaginians in the Third Punic War in 146 BC, which also included the coastal part of modern Libya. The Latin suffix -ica can sometimes be used to denote a land (e.g., in Celtica from Celtae, as used by Julius Caesar). The later Muslim region of Ifriqiya, following its conquest of the Byzantine (Eastern Roman) Empire's Exarchatus Africae, also preserved a form of the name.

According to the Romans, Africa lies to the west of Egypt, while "Asia" was used to refer to Anatolia and lands to the east. A definite line was drawn between the two continents by the geographer Ptolemy (85–165 AD), indicating Alexandria along the Prime Meridian and making the isthmus of Suez and the Red Sea the boundary between Asia and Africa. As Europeans came to understand the real extent of the continent, the idea of "Africa" expanded with their knowledge.

Other etymological hypotheses have been postulated for the ancient name "Africa":

- The 1st-century Jewish historian Flavius Josephus asserted that it was named for Epher ('calf'), grandson of Abraham according to Gen. 25:4, whose descendants, he claimed, had invaded Libya.
- Isidore of Seville in his 7th-century Etymologiae XIV.5.2. suggests "Africa comes from the Latin aprica, meaning "sunny".
- Massey, in 1881, stated that Africa is derived from the Egyptian af-rui-ka, meaning "to turn toward the opening of the Ka." The Ka is the energetic double of every person and the "opening of the Ka" refers to a womb or birthplace. Africa would be, for the Egyptians, "the birthvlace."
- Michèle Fruyt in 1976 proposed linking the Latin word with africus "south wind", which would be of Umbrian origin and mean originally "rainy wind".
- Robert R. Stieglitz of Rutgers University in 1984 proposed: "The name Africa, derived from the Latin \*Aphir-ic-a, is cognate to Hebrew Ophir ['rich']."
- Ibn Khallikan and some other historians claim that the name of Africa came from a Himyarite king called Afrikin ibn Kais ibn Saifi also called "Afrikus son of Abraham" who subdued Ifriqiya.
- Arabic afrīqā (feminine noun) and ifrīqiyā, now usually pronounced afrīqiyā (feminine) 'Africa', from 'afara [' = 'ain, not 'alif] 'to be dusty' from 'afar 'dust, powder' and 'afir 'dried, dried up by the sun, withered' and 'affara 'to dry in the sun on hot sand' or 'to sprinkle with dust'.
- Possibly Phoenician faraga in the sense of 'colony, separation'

# History

Africa is considered by most paleoanthropologists to be the oldest inhabited territory on Earth, with the Human species originating from the continent. During the mid-20th century, anthropologists discovered many fossils and evidence of human occupation perhaps as early as 7 million years ago (BP=before present). Fossil remains of several species of early apelike humans thought to have evolved into modern man, such as Australopithecus afarensis (radiometrically dated to approximately 3.9–3.0 million years BP, Paranthropus boisei (c. 2.3–1.4 million years BP) and Homo ergaster (c. 1.9 million–600,000 years BP) have been discovered.

After the evolution of Homo sapiens approximately 350,000 to 260,000 years BP in Africa, the continent was mainly populated by groups of hunter-gatherers. These first modern humans left Africa and populated the rest of the globe during the Out of Africa II migration dated to approximately 50,000 years BP, exiting the continent either across Bab-el-Mandeb over the Red Sea, the Strait of Gibraltar in Morocco, or the Isthmus of Suez in Egypt.

Other migrations of modern humans within the African continent have been dated to that time, with evidence of early human settlement found in Southern Africa, Southeast Africa, North Africa, and the Sahara.

# Emergence of civilization

The size of the Sahara has historically been extremely variable, with its area rapidly fluctuating and at times disappearing depending on global climatic conditions. At the end of the Ice ages, estimated to have been around 10,500 BC, the Sahara had again become a green fertile valley, and its African populations returned from the interior and coastal highlands in Sub-Saharan Africa, with rock art paintings depicting a fertile Sahara and large populations discovered in Tassili n'Ajjer dating back perhaps 10 millennia. However, the warming and drying climate meant that by 5000 BC, the Sahara region was becoming increasingly dry and hostile. Around 3500 BC, due to a tilt in the earth's orbit, the Sahara experienced a period of rapid desertification. The population trekked out of the Sahara

region towards the Nile Valley below the Second Cataract where they made permanent or semi-permanent settlements. A major climatic recession occurred, lessening the heavy and persistent rains in Central and Eastern Africa. Since this time, dry conditions have prevailed in Eastern Africa and, increasingly during the last 200 years, in Ethiopia.

The domestication of cattle in Africa preceded agriculture and seems to have existed alongside hunter-gatherer cultures. It is speculated that by 6000 BC, cattle were domesticated in North Africa. In the Sahara-Nile complex, people domesticated many animals, including the donkey and a small screw-horned goat which was common from Algeria to Nubia.

Between the 10,000–9,000 BC, pottery was independently invented in the region of Mali in the savannah of West Africa.



In the steppes and savannahs of the Sahara and Sahel in Northern West Africa, the Nilo-Saharan speakers and Mandé peoples started to collect and domesticate wild millet, African rice and sorghum between 8,000 and 6,000 BC. Later, gourds, watermelons, castor beans, and cotton were also collected and domesticated. They also started making pottery and built stone settlements (e.g., Tichitt, Oualata). Fishing, using bone-tipped harpoons, became a major activity in the numerous streams and lakes formed from the increased rains. Mande peoples have been credited with the independent development of agriculture by about 3,000–4,000 BC. In West Africa, the wet phase ushered in an expanding rainforest and wooded savanna from Senegal to Cameroon. Between 9,000 and 5,000 BC, Niger-Congo speakers domesticated the oil palm and raffia palm. Black-eyed peas and voandzeia (African groundnuts), were domesticated, followed by okra and kola nuts. Since most of the plants grew in the forest, the Niger-Congo speakers invented polished stone axes for clearing forest.

Around 4000 BC, the Saharan climate started to become drier at an





exceedingly fast pace. This climate change caused lakes and rivers to shrink significantly and caused increasing desertification. This, in turn, decreased the amount of land conducive to settlements and helped to cause migrations of farming communities to the more tropical climate of West Africa.

By the first millennium BC, ironworking had been introduced in Northern Africa. Around that time it also became established in parts of sub-Saharan Africa, either through independent invention there or diffusion from the north and vanished under unknown circumstances around 500 AD, having lasted approximately 2,000 years, and by 500 BC, metalworking began to become commonplace in West Africa. Ironworking was fully established by roughly 500 BC in many areas of East and West Africa, although other regions didn't begin ironworking until the early centuries AD. Copper objects from Egypt, North Africa, Nubia, and Ethiopia dating from around 500 BC have been excavated in West Africa, suggesting that Trans-Saharan trade networks had been established by this date.



# Early civilizations

At about 3300 BC, the historical record opens in Northern Africa with the rise of literacy in the Pharaonic civilization of Ancient Egypt. One of the world's earliest and longest-lasting civilizations, the Egyptian state continued, with varying levels of influence over other areas, until 343 BC. Egyptian influence reached deep into modern-day Libya and Nubia, and, according to Martin Bernal, as far north as Crete.

An independent centre of civilization with trading links to Phoenicia was established by Phoenicians from Tyre on the north-west African coast at Carthage.

European exploration of Africa began with Ancient Greeks and Romans. In 332 BC, Alexander the Great was welcomed as a liberator in Persian-occupied Egypt. He founded Alexandria in Egypt, which would become the prosperous capital of the Ptolemaic dynasty after his death. Following the conquest of North Africa's Mediterranean coastline by the Roman Empire, the area was integrated economically and culturally into the Roman system. Roman settlement occurred in modern Tunisia and elsewhere along the coast. The first Roman emperor native to North Africa was Septimius Severus, born in Leptis Magna in present-day Libya—his mother was Italian Roman and his father was Punic.


Christianity spread across these areas at an early date, from Judaea via Egypt and beyond the borders of the Roman world into Nubia by AD 340 at the latest, it had become the state religion of the Aksumite Empire. Syro-Greek missionaries, who arrived by way of the Red Sea, were responsible for this theological development.

In the early 7th century, the newly formed Arabian Islamic Caliphate expanded into Egypt, and then into North Africa. In a short while, the

local Berber elite had been integrated into Muslim Arab tribes. When the Umayyad capital Damascus fell in the 8th century, the Islamic centre of the Mediterranean shifted from Syria to Qayrawan in North Africa. Islamic North Africa had become diverse, and a hub for mystics, scholars, jurists, and philosophers. During the above-mentioned period, Islam spread to sub-Saharan Africa, mainly through trade routes and migration.

In West Africa, Dhar Tichitt and Oualata in present-day Mauritania figure prominently among the early urban centers, dated to 2,000 BC. About 500 stone settlements litter the region in the former savannah of the Sahara. Its inhabitants fished and grew millet. It has been found by Augustin Holl that the Soninke of the Mandé peoples were likely responsible for constructing such settlements. Around 300 BC the region became more desiccated and the settlements began to decline, most likely relocating to Koumbi Saleh. Architectural evidence and the comparison of pottery styles suggest that Dhar Tichitt was related to the subsequent Ghana Empire. Djenné-Djenno (in present-day Mali) was settled around 300 BC, and the town grew to house a sizable Iron Age population, as evidenced by crowded cemeteries. Living structures were made of sun-dried mud. By 250 BC Djenné-Djenno had become a large, thriving market town.

Farther south, in central Nigeria, around 1,500 BC, the Nok culture developed on the Jos Plateau. It was a highly centralized community. The Nok people produced lifelike representations in terracotta, including human heads and human figures, elephants, and other animals. By 500 BC, and possibly earlier, they were smelting iron. By 200 AD the Nok culture had vanished and vanished under unknown circumstances around 500 AD, having lasted approximately 2,000 years. Based on stylistic similarities with the Nok terracottas, the bronze figurines of the Yoruba kingdom of Ife and those of the Bini kingdom of Benin are suggested to be continuations of the traditions of the earlier Nok culture







Pre-colonial Africa possessed perhaps as many as 10,000 different states and polities characterized by many different sorts of political organization and rule. These included small family groups of hunter-gatherers such as the San people of southern Africa; larger, more structured groups such as the family clan groupings of the Bantu-speaking peoples of central, southern, and eastern Africa; heavily structured clan groups in the Horn of Africa; the large Sahelian kingdoms; and autonomous city-states and kingdoms such as those of the Akan; Edo, Yoruba, and Igbo people in West Africa; and the Swahili coastal trading towns of Southeast Africa.

By the ninth century AD, a string of dynastic states, including the earliest Hausa states, stretched across the sub-Saharan savannah from the western regions to central Sudan. The most powerful of these states were Ghana, Gao, and the Kanem-Bornu Empire. Ghana declined in the eleventh century, but was succeeded by the Mali Empire which consolidated much of western Sudan in the thirteenth century. Kanem accepted Islam in the eleventh century.

In the forested regions of the West African coast, independent kingdoms grew with little influence from the Muslim north. The Kingdom of Nri was established around the ninth century and was one of the first. It is also one of the oldest kingdoms in present-day Nigeria and was ruled by the Eze Nri. The Nri kingdom is famous for its elaborate bronzes, found at the town of Igbo-Ukwu. The bronzes have been dated from as far back as the ninth century.

Slavery had long been practiced in Africa. Between the 15th and the 19th centuries, the Atlantic slave trade took an estimated 7–12 million slaves to the New World. In addition, more than 1 million Europeans were captured by Barbary pirates and sold as slaves in North Africa between the 16th and 19th centuries.

The Scramble for Africa, also called the Partition of Africa or the Conquest of Africa, was the invasion, occupation, division, and colonization of most of Africa by seven Western European powers during a short period known to historians as the New Imperialism (between 1881 and 1914). The 10 percent of Africa that was under formal European control in 1870 increased to almost 90 percent by 1914, with only Ethiopia (Abyssinia) and Liberia remaining independent, though Ethiopia would later be invaded and colonized by Italy in 1936.

The Berlin Conference of 1884, which regulated European colonization and trade in Africa, is usually referred to as the starting point of the Scramble for Africa. There were considerable political rivalries among the European empires in the last quarter of the 19th century. Partitioning Africa was effected without wars between European nations.



Imperial rule by Europeans would continue until after the conclusion of World War II, when almost all remaining colonial territories gradually obtained formal independence. Independence movements in Africa gained momentum following World War II, which left the major European powers weakened. In 1951, Libya, a former Italian colony, gained independence. In 1956, Tunisia and Morocco won their independence from France. Ghana followed suit the next year (March 1957) becoming the first of the sub-Saharan colonies to be granted independence. Most of the rest of the continent became independent over the next decade.

Portugal's overseas presence in Sub-Saharan Africa (most notably in Angola, Cape Verde, Mozambique, Guinea-Bissau and São Tomé and Príncipe) lasted from the 16th century to 1975, after the Estado Novo regime was overthrown in a military coup in Lisbon. Rhodesia unilaterally declared independence from the United Kingdom in 1965, under the white minority government of Ian Smith, but was not internationally recognized as an independent state (as Zimbabwe) until 1980, when black nationalists gained power after a bitter guerrilla war. Although South Africa was one of the first African countries to gain independence, the state remained under the control of the country's white minority through a system of racial segregation known as apartheid until 1994.

Today, Africa contains 54 sovereign countries, most of which have borders that were drawn during the era of European colonialism. Since colonialism, African states have frequently been hampered by instability, corruption, violence, and authoritarianism.

The vast majority of African states are republics that operate under some form of the presidential system of rule. However, few of them have been able to sustain democratic governments on a permanent basis, and many have instead cycled through a series of coups, producing military dictatorships.

Great instability was mainly the result of marginalization of ethnic groups, and graft under these leaders. For political gain, many leaders fanned ethnic conflicts, some of which had been exacerbated, or even created, by colonial rule. In many countries, the military was perceived as being the only group that could effectively maintain order, and it ruled many nations in Africa during the 1970s and early 1980s.

During the period from the early 1960s to the late 1980s, Africa had more than 70 coups and 13 presidential assassinations. Border and territorial disputes were also common, with the European-imposed borders of many nations being widely contested through armed conflicts.

Although it has abundant natural resources, Africa remains the world's poorest and least-developed continent (other than Antarctica), the result of a variety of causes that may include governments that have often committed serious human rights violations, failed central planning, high levels of illiteracy, lack of access to foreign capital, and frequent tribal and military conflict (ranging from guerrilla warfare to genocide). Its total nominal GDP remains behind that of the United States, China, Japan, Germany, the United Kingdom, India and France. According to the United Nations' Human Development Report in 2003, the bottom 24 ranked nations (151st to 175th) were all African.

From 1995 to 2005, Africa's rate of economic growth increased, averaging 5% in 2005. Some countries experienced still higher growth rates, notably Angola, Sudan and Equatorial Guinea, all of which had recently begun extracting their petroleum reserves or had expanded their oil extraction capacity.

The continent is believed to hold 90% of the world's cobalt, 90% of its platinum, 50% of its gold, 98% of its chromium, 70% of its tantalite, 64% of its manganese and one-third of its uranium. The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) has 70% of the world's coltan, a mineral used in the production of tantalum capacitors for electronic devices such as cell phones. The DRC also has more than 30% of the world's diamond reserves. Guinea is the world's largest exporter of bauxite. As the growth in Africa has been driven mainly by services and not manufacturing or agriculture, it has been growth without jobs and without reduction in poverty levels. In fact, the food security crisis of 2008 which took place on the heels of the global financial crisis pushed 100 million people into food insecurity. Africa is starting to focus on agricultural innovation as its new engine for regional trade and prosperity.

In recent years, the world has seen the potential in Africa, many countries are investing and exploring the ventures with African various parts







Africa's population has rapidly increased over the last 40 years, and is consequently relatively young. In some African states, more than half the population is under 25 years of age. The total number of people in Africa increased from 229 million in 1950 to 630 million in 1990. As of now, the population of Africa is estimated at 1.3 billion. Africa's total population surpassing other continents is fairly recent; African population surpassed Europe in the 1990s. This increase in number of babies born in Africa compared to the rest of the world is expected to reach approximately 37% in the year 2050, an increase of 21% since 1990 alone.

# Languages

By most estimates, well over a thousand languages are spoken in Africa. Most are of African origin, though some are of European or Asian origin. Africa is the most multilingual continent in the world, and it is not rare for individuals to fluently speak not only multiple African languages, but one or more European ones as well. There are four major language families indigenous to Africa:

- The Afroasiatic languages are a language family of about 240 languages and 285 million people widespread throughout the Horn of Africa, North Africa, the Sahel, and Southwest Asia.
- The Nilo-Saharan language family consists of more than a hundred languages spoken by 30 million people. Nilo-Saharan languages are spoken by ethnic groups in Chad, Ethiopia, Kenya, Nigeria, Sudan, South Sudan, Uganda, and northern Tanzania.
- The Niger-Congo language family covers much of Sub-Saharan Africa. In terms of number of languages, it is the largest language family in Africa and perhaps one of the largest in the world.
- The Khoisan languages number about fifty and are spoken in Southern Africa by approximately 400,000 people. Many of the Khoisan languages are endangered. The Khoi and San peoples are considered the original inhabitants of this part of Africa.





The Culture of Africa is varied and manifold, consisting of a mixture of countries with various tribes that each have their own unique characteristic from the continent of Africa. It is a product of the diverse populations that inhabit the continent of Africa and the African Diaspora. Culture, in a general sense, is defined as a collective mass of distinctive qualities belonging to a certain group of people. These qualities include laws, morals, beliefs, knowledge, art, customs, and any other attributes belonging to a member of that society. Africa has numerous ethnic nationalities all with varying qualities such as language, dishes, greetings, and dances. However, all African peoples share a series of dominant cultural traits which distinguish African Culture from the rest of the world. For example, social values, religion, morals, political values, economics and aesthetic values all contribute to African Culture. Expressions of culture are abundant within Africa, with large amounts of cultural diversity being found not only across different countries but also within single countries. Even though African cultures are widely diverse, they are also, when closely studied, seen to have many similarities; for example, the morals they uphold, their love and respect for their culture, as well as the strong respect they hold for the aged and the important, i.e. kings and chiefs.

# Clothing

African clothing and fashion is a diverse topic that is able to provide a look into different African cultures. Clothing varies from brightly colored textiles, to abstractly embroidered robes, to colorful beaded bracelets and necklaces. Since Africa is such a large and diverse continent, traditional clothing differs throughout each country. For example, many countries in West Africa have a "distinct regional dress styles that are the products of long-standing textile crafts in weaving, dyeing, and printing", but these traditions are still able to coexist with western styles. A large contrast in African fashion is between rural and urban societies. Urban societies typically are exposed more to trade and the changing world, while it takes more time for new western trends to get to rural areas.









# African Arts and Crafts

Africa has a rich tradition of arts and crafts. African arts and crafts find expression in a variety of woodcarvings, brass and leather artworks. African arts and crafts also include sculpture, paintings, pottery, ceremonial and religious headgear and dress. Certain African cultures have always emphasized personal appearance, and jewelry has remained an important personal accessory. Many pieces of such jewelry are made of cowry shells and similar materials. Similarly, masks are made with elaborate designs and are an important part of some cultures in Africa. Masks are used in various ceremonies depicting ancestors and spirits, mythological characters, and deities.





African art describes the modern and historical paintings, sculptures, installations, and other visual culture from native or indigenous Africans and the African continent.

Pottery, metalwork, sculpture, architecture, textile art and fibre art, are important visual art forms across Africa.

- The human figure has always been the primary subject matter for most African art, and this emphasis even influenced certain European traditions. The human figure may symbolize the living or the dead, may reference chiefs, dancers, or various trades such as drummers or hunters, or even may be an anthropomorphic representation of a god or have other votive function. Another common theme is the inter-morphosis of human and animal.
- African art takes many forms and is made from many different materials. Most African artworks are wood sculptures, probably because wood is a very widespread material. Jewellery is a popular art form and is used to indicate rank, affiliation with a group, or purely for aesthetics. African jewellery is made from such diverse materials as Tiger's eye stone, haematite, sisal, coconut shell, beads and ebony wood. Sculptures can be wooden, ceramic or carved out of stone like the famous Shona sculptures, and decorated or sculpted pottery comes from many regions. Various forms of textiles are made including chitenge, mud cloth and kente cloth. Mosaics made of butterfly wings or coloured sand are popular in West Africa. Early African sculptures can be identified as being made of terracotta and bronze.





# Music

Given the vastness of the African continent, its music is diverse, with regions and nations having many distinct musical traditions. African music includes the genres Jùjú, Fuji, Highlife, Makossa, Kizomba, Afrobeat and others. The music and dance of the African diaspora, formed to varying degrees on African musical traditions, include American music like Dixieland, the blues, jazz, old-time, and bluegrass and many Caribbean genres, such as calypso and soca. Latin American music genres such as zouk, bomba, conga, rumba, son, salsa, cumbia and samba, were founded on the music of enslaved Africans, and have in turn influenced African popular music.

Like the music of Asia, India and the Middle East, it is a highly rhythmic music. The complex rhythmic patterns often involving one rhythm played against another to create a polyrhythm.

# Dance

The term African dance refers mainly to the numerous dance styles of Sub-Saharan Africa. These dances must be viewed in close connection with the traditional rhythms and music traditions of the region. Music and dancing is an integral part of many traditional African societies. Songs and dances facilitate teaching and promoting social values, celebrating special events and major life milestones, performing oral history and other recitations, and spiritual experiences. African dance utilizes the concepts of polyrhythm and total body articulation. African dances are a collective activity performed in large groups, with significant interaction between dancers and onlookers in the majority of styles.



# Sports

Africa's most common & Favorite Sport is Football-played at almost all over the continent. In recent years, the continent has made major progress in terms of state-of-the-art basketball facilities. The number of African basketball players who drafted into the NBA has experienced major growth in the 2010s. Cricket is also popular in some African nations like South Africa, Zimbabwe and Kenya. Rugby is another popular sport in South African nations, Namibia and Zimbabwe



# Serving the community before self

'Thy need is greater than mine.' is a saying many of us would have heard. But how easy and practical is it to keep other's needs ahead of yours? Well, in Dr S.R. Mishra's opinion, it's not difficult. "As long as one has the willingness to serve the society, power or position does not matter. He can serve in every little way possible," he affirms. From being a young medicine graduate in India to being one of the most sought after politicians revered for his unflinching service attitude towards the African society, he has left a legacy for generations to follow.

Dr Swarup Ranjan Mishra, popularly known as Dr Mishra's story began in the small town of Cuttack, Orissa, a state in India where he was born to a middle-class visionary family. While his father worked in an international firm back in the 60s, his mother held a Master's degree in Political Science and Economics, which considering the socio-economic situation in

those times was a huge accomplishment in itself. His parents raised him with modern values and a visionary attitude. "Everything I have achieved is due to the Lord's mercy and the teachings of my parents. They brought me up with the values that helped me become what I am today," says Dr Mishra.

From a young age, he wanted to pursue his career in medicine. He completed his basic MBBS and post-graduation in Obstetrics and Gynecology from India after which he began working as a Junior Consultant in P.D.Hinduja hospital in Mumbai. And that's where his life took a beautiful turn as he met his wife Dr Pallavi there. "We both worked in the same hospital under the renowned Dr Nargis Motasa and Madam Urvashi Jha, and that's how we connected, and decided to marry," he recalls fondly.

His wife hailed from South India and he belonged to East India. Due to the cultural differences, he mentions how initially the alliance was a tipsy turvy ride but eventually, both of them developed synergies and compatibility. It was, in-fact, during this period where their seniors exposed them towards medical career abroad and the growth potentials there.



Dr Mishra and his wife Pallavi decided to move abroad, their first stop being Ireland. From there, they moved to Kiel, Germany to pursue his diploma in Gynecology Endoscopy. Then, they decided to move to Australia for further education but due to financial constraints, decided to move to Kenya instead. He joined as a lecturer and consultant at Department of Reproductive Health, College of Health Sciences, MOI University, Kenya in 1997.

But as destiny brings you where you ought to be, within six months of their stay, the duo decided to make Kenya their home for good. "It is better to become the head of a cat than to become the tail of the tiger," he remarks. Staying in Kenya, they knew the immense scope they had to not only grow individually but collectively. There was a lot to do in health,

education and practice. "We had the experience from India and Europe which we could now translate to Africa and transform the society," he says. "Whenever I would take a flight from Africa to India, I would see nearly half the flight being full of terminally sick people, which hurt me a lot. That's when I took an oath to bring high end medical treatments and technologies to Africa so their people didn't have to travel to get treated," he adds.

He continued working during the day but harboured his dream all throughout in his heart and mind. As you seek, so shall you find, and so finally in 2005, Dr Mishra and his wife came across a lucrative opportunity - to start their own practice in the private sector. There was a hospital called Pacifica which hadn't been properly run by the Africans, Indians or the Chinese based there. With the little savings

they had, they purchased the hospital, renaming it to Mediheal Hospital.

Today, over 19 years after its establishment, the hospital consists of 1800 full time staff out of which 250 are Indian expatriates, spread across 2 countries for now and are expanding into 2 more shortly. Fulfilling his dream, Dr Mishra has not only brought in the latest technology into Africa but has also ensured to provide local treatment for the most complex medical cases too so his people, the Africans, don't have to travel far and wide. "Today, less than 10% of Africans in Kenya travel abroad for treatment. In-fact, we've become a renowned name for countries in East, South and North of Africa for treatments. They send their patients to us for treatment, which is an achievement. Now we're busy planning new hospitals in their countries too," he says.

















Following his milestone accomplishment in the medical field, in 2016, he was approached by the local people to contest for elections. It came as a surprise for Dr Mishra and he mentions how initially he didn't take it seriously. When he came home, discussed this idea casually with his wife and mother, he was amused when they consented to it.

"They said, if you'll be able to perform in this role, benefit people, then do it," he adds. Taking their agreement into consideration, he contested for the elections and in September 2017, he was appointed as the Vice Chair for the Health Committee. Today, he is Member of Parliament from Kesses constituency, the

Director of Economic Diplomacy at Kenya Chamber of Commerce & Industries, a member of India Kenya Business Council and Member on Parliamentary Committee on Interior, Security and Administrati. He is also member of parliament for peace and also selected as member of international parliament for global health.

When businessmen become politicians, they often get digressed. But Dr Mishra's strong ideals didn't let him waiver from his main goal serving the people. After entering politics, he has initiated many things such as high education scholarships, cow donation programs for the needy, underprivileged ladies who were

the sole earners of their families, and more. "We also initiated a program where we provided help to over 20,000 individuals who wanted to start small scale businesses like farming, cattle rearing, poultry farming, cyber cafe and irrigation."

With initiatives like these, he became instantly popular among the masses. But despite all the accolades, Dr Mishra considers himself a leader and not a politician. "A politician is concerned about the next elections and a leader is concerned about the next generation," he says. He feels really blessed to have lived all the three stages of his life to the fullest - academics, business and politics.











All through his journey, Dr Mishra explains how his wife has been standing like a rock besides him. "Pallavi is very different. I am a bit casual but she is very organised, disciplined and meticulous. She has a fixed routine to follow and trust me, if I could live 10% like her, I would be in a different place," he describes. "She has really accommodated very well to my lifestyle and supported me wherever I needed her. My parents trust her more than me." Together, they are parents to two wonderful children, a son who's pursuing his Masters in Finance and Economics from London and working for an HR Capital firm, and a daughter who is pursuing Corporate Law in Kenya.

Now this would make many of us wonder what

would a busy man like him do in his free time. Well, surprisingly, Dr Mishra doesn't take specific offs but whenever he wants to enjoy, he'll invite some African youth over dinner, listen to some music and dance.



With a bag full of life experiences and quality education by his side, it was only in 1982, when he got married, that he decided to move out of London and start something of his own.















In his opinion, the UAE is one of the most


secured and business -friendly countries, with a proactive government who maintains the infrastructure of the country very well.



His unbelievable business journey begins with this wide-eyed curly haired White Rhodesian child peculiarly selling fresh vegetables to African mineworkers by setting up a make-shift store where he lived in a small mining town in Zimbabwe. But as they say, a strong building is built on a firm foundation and tall trees have deep roots; so does Ken too bring with him a most-interesting legacy of entrepreneurial adventure that was built upon the foundations of his wayfarer forefathers, and still rocks today.

According to family legend, Ken's ancestors were descendants of the Vikings – a renowned warrior people who originally occupied the

north of England, in about A.D. 1000. His paternal great-great-grandfather, Robert Good Sharpe was appointed a Rear Admiral of the Northern Fleet of the British Navy.

Also his other great-great-grandfather, Sir Joseph Wilson Swan invented and patented the world's first electric light bulb some three months before the well-known Thomas Edison did and won a case against Edison in the British courts, forcing him to accept Sir Swan as a 50 percent shareholder in EdiSwan, the first-ever light bulb company which eventually became part of AIE and behemoth manufacturer, General Electric.





Sir Joseph's daughter Hilda, met Captain Robert Sharpe, Ken's great-grandfather, on a skiing holiday in Switzerland and they migrated as a young married couple to start the family's long African adventure. Their son Dr. Noel Sharpe, followed in his father's footsteps to become a famous geologist in Africa. Dr. Sharpe helped the legendary Tiny Rowland acquire his mining interests for Lonrho, which the largest African became one of conglomerates ever, at its peak.

Despite such extraordinary, inspiring tales of success behind him, Ken was not born with a silver spoon in his mouth and in fact his father sent him on a one-way ticket with only 100 pounds at age 16 to the UK to make his own way in life . Growing up during the deadly Rhodesian civil war is what catapulted him

towards an era of huge social change and led to the inception of cultural integration in the country of his birth Zimbabwe, which he openly adores. Despite living through sanctions in the 70's and facing many tough challenges in life, Ken has fought through it all with his positive can-do attitude of 'seeing the glass half full' and his determined spirit of never giving up. Ken's youthful aspiration to be an RAF fighter pilot was quickly overtaken by his burgeoning love and passion for business at a tender age. He has started more than 100 companies and is the founder of the West Group which he started as an FMCG import and distribution company in 1991.

Ken grew it into a large diverse holdings until 2007 when he began a strategic re-focus, rationalization and exit of legacy assets to create

Prop, Zimbabwe's West largest and most-prominent developer private of exceptional properties in Zimbabwe.

The eminent businessman possesses an extensive 30-year experience in management roles and has chaired various operating management teams, boards of directors, and shareholders. His business knowledge and skills extend to multiple organizations in Zimbabwe, Africa and other global locations. He is widely-recognized as a prolific and influential business leader who has set an example as a high achiever for everyone to follow. His overriding passion for Zimbabwe to drive investment, job creation, resource availability and transformational development is very evident through all the projects he undertakes.









Ken acknowledges that Africa has the largest youth demographic in the world and that its people were its biggest asset. Africa is a continent of highly-educated people and Ken calls upon others to invest in Africa as the time is now ripe.

Asked to share a personal moment that changed his life, Ken recalled when aged only 18, he knew the minute he first laid his eyes on the now love of his life, Ludmila (aka Joanna), born in Ukraine, and upon seeing her, confidently told Mark his best friend at the time, that she was going to be his wife. He shares that it became his pre-eminent purpose to pursue his heart and follow her to the then USSR with only her address and a telephone number (those days had no cellphones), albeit in the middle of the infamous Russian winter and only \$100 in his back pocket, landing in Moscow and discovering he was in the wrong city as she lived closer to Kyiv.


Ken somehow managed to sweet-talk Joanna's guarded Communist mother, convincing her that their marriage was meant to be and he struggled to get permission to take her back to Africa to start a life together. Another story for a different day and suffice to say they now stand as a very successful and happily-married couple that has stood the test of time. Together, they have a beautiful daughter Tatiana. She studied at the leading King's College in London and went on to study innovation and tech at the Ivy League's world-famous Stanford University, and was now launching her own pioneering tech business at the Dubai Expo 2021.

The philanthropic couple also fostered their son Denzel at 15 and put him through law school. Ken values his family over everything, having always done the best for them and kept his promise to himself to do far-more for his children than his parents did for him. At 17, he was motivated enough to decide to break away

from the chain of generational mistakes and be different. His aim was always to provide the best education in a safe environment and provide sufficient resources that would be beneficial to his children – and beyond – to his grandchildren.

In his quest for success Ken reflects that in his 20's he had somewhat carelessly neglected his health by being a workaholic. It is only during his 30s that he started concentrating on maintaining good health. He strongly believes in the saying: "No amount of success in the world makes up for a failure in the family." With equilibrium in his mind, body, and spirit, Ken has divided his life into 12 segments that he prudently reviews individually every month.

Ken considers himself as both a learner and a teacher. Life has always had something good to teach him and as a man of strong faith, he believes everything happens for a reason. Ken credits his solid spiritual transformation to a life-altering accident he encountered in 2007 in Canada, when he had his Damascene moment, surviving a near-death experience whilst skiing for the first time and bravely off piste. After hitting a tree at high speed, Ken

gravely severed his brain from his skull and left a haematoma the size of a large pear, and endured a 6-hour craniotomy and a five-day coma after doctors had given him a minuscule 2 % chance of survival with the chilling caveat that even if he did wake up from the coma, he would be a vegetable! Yet the miracle was that he was fully restored with no side effects of any kind and all his faculties intact. Ken now spiritually considers life as a gift from God, and what we choose to do with it is our gift to God.

Throughout the course of his notable career and life, charitable Ken has supported various orphanages and youth projects. He strongly believes in impact investment and giving a hand up and not mere handouts as a way for

society and its people to permanently and sustainably improve the lives of the underprivileged and the benefactors' lives too in the process.

The Forbes Award has reinvigorated and keeps reminding Ken of a truism taught in his faith and the importance of leading correctly: "If the blind lead the blind, both shall fall in the ditch" and we ought to develop a culture of celebrating success and being happy for the success of others.

Ken's declared purpose and mission is seemingly simple; to lead and have real, lasting, and sustainable impact in his personal, family, and business lives altogether.

REJESH SATIIJA, Group Chairman, Sun & Sand Group of Companies

Most of us have a passion for something or the other in life. But what differentiates leaders from the rest is their zeal to follow their passion despite all hardships. Such a leader is Rejesh Satiija, who currently serves as the Group Chairman of the Sun and Sand Group of Companies, with offices in London as well as Dubai. But his true identity,

fortunately, goes far beyond. Born in a small village near Ambala, India, he completed his primary education in Haryana, where his mother taught. Rejesh describes himself as being an inherently calm and mature child; he spent more time with the teachers in school than with the students his age.

When he passed school, upon his father's insistence, Rajesh took up engineering so he could secure a good Government job. But fate had its own will. He graduated in 1986, and in 1989 left for Dubai to set up a business there.

But, surprisingly, even after over 30 years of having lived in Dubai, he doesn't have an affinity for it. He says: "I have a house here, an office, bank accounts and family. But my soul is in Africa."

When Rajesh first travelled to Africa in 1990, he knew nobody there. "I had no connections, there was no communication and no money." All he had was the \$1 his father had given to him before he left India. "That dollar turned me into a billionaire." But it didn't come easy.


Rajesh has seen his share of hardships. He mentions how once he went without food for 21 days and had to be hospitalized. "Everyone goes through hardship", says Rajesh, who has now built an empire and quite the legacy in Africa.

It all started when the Indian government banned trade and import in the early 1990s. The possibility arose to import teakwood from Nigeria. Within a year Rajesh became the largest exporter of teak. He further expanded his exports into utensils, charcoal, textiles, and electrical goods. He bought scrap and converted it into auto-parts.

Eventually, his work grew from trading to manufacturing, and he began to export to Japan. In-fact, he was the first in all of Africa to be listed on the London Metal Exchange and remains the only one to do so till date. He exported to brands like Toyota, Rolls Royce, and Honda, becoming so successful that the President sent a special team to his factory to see the manufacture of alloys to be sent to Japan. He became the recipient of two Presidential awards and continued to export until 2016, after which he sold the plant.

Despite being so successful in business, Rajesh's goal has never been to make money. It has always been to help the African people. He describes how once he was held at gunpoint by robbers. Instead of becoming terrified or angry, he brought them some chicken and beer from the kitchen and asked them to relax while he collected all his money and belongings for them from his room. "It's the mindset of kindness that changes people. Those same robbers became my good friends and protected my factory in the night."

He owned a gold mine in Ghana but couldn't bear to see children on the same land sleeping without clothes. "God has given me a lot of opportunities in Africa. Africa is full of resources, 15 -16 times more than the combined world economy. But they have no infrastructure to utilize them. The people here are suffering." Rajesh has dedicated his entire life to Africa.

"Africa is in my blood, I cannot go back to India." Every day he spends his own money to raise funds for the poor, without getting anything in return. He does this out of feelings of pure love, passion, and belonging to his motherland, to his Africa. One of his intentions is to build machines that will condense water from the humid air to provide clean drinking water to civilians. He built a company called Africans for Africa, to administer healthcare and telemedicine. He also wants to make sanitary napkins that will prevent infections and visits to the doctors.

When asked about his personal life, Rejesh says he believes in leading a balanced lifestyle. He is very spiritual and practices meditation and

reiki, but is also an astute businessman. He loves spending time with family and friends, and also does yoga to keep fit. He stays with his wife, Renu, in Dubai, while his two children, Garima and Atul, are pursuing their Masters degrees in the UK. He is proud of them being for being self-sufficient, economically, as well as mentally and spiritually.

His long-term goal is to help ease poverty in all 54 countries in Africa. For this, he wishes to involve Presidential leaders and work as one committed force for the betterment of continental Africa. "Dynasties and countries come and go. I believe in one Africa."

He has a message for non-Africans who want to

do business in Africa: "Don't come with the mindset of commercialization. Think about giving, rather than taking. Go with your heart and see the results. Opportunities will automatically present themselves." 

He says, "I am constantly pursuing faster, better, and more." It is something he wishes to improve on positively.

















them all. We're talking about a leader who not only changed his reality but also that of others through his efforts and visionary thinking - Yoro Diallo, Board Member of Gambia Sierra Leone and Guinee Conakry, Vista Bank.





Yoro hails from a small West African tribe which has been famous for the agriculture and cattle farming. Born in a village called Ibel, Yoro had witnessed challenging times ever since he was young.

He grew up during the 60s which for Africa was a decade of upheavals and independence. Amidst colonial tensions, Yoro lost his father at a very young age. "My father was under 45 when he died leaving behind 14 children and three wives," he says. Needless to say, his family dynamics, post his father's untimely demise, became very complicated, pushing Yoro to find out other alternatives for himself. While he continued studying in Africa, he began exploring opportunities as after high school, in those times, students would often travel abroad for pursuing further studies.

As a norm, majority of the students went to France but he didn't want to go there. "They'd done enough damage to our country and I didn't feel like going there. The second option was Russia where we

were offered scholarships too but that didn't impress me either," he adds. Finally, after much deliberation, he decided to pursue his studies in the USA.

Back then, former USA President John. F. Kennedy launched an initiative wherein American students would travel to Africa to familiarise themselves with their culture, learn their language, skills and receive international exposure. "I was a part of that initiative where I would teach young graduates how to mingle with people in Africa, the general do's and don'ts," he mentions. After this stint, Yoro took up a few odd jobs before he decided to pursue formal education in California. He enrolled himself at the Claremont Men's college, California to pursue a B.A and then moved to San Francisco to pursue his M.B.A.

It was there when he started working for City Bank, that his career in banking kicked off with a story to tell.

He also met his first wife in the USA who was an American citizen. Eventually, he too received his citizenship.

A few years later, the bank he worked in wanted to expand their frontiers to Africa and the Middle East. "During the 80s, Bahrain was the focal of the Middle East, nobody even knew Dubai," he remarks. "I frequented Bahrain and Africa quite often during those times to train the teams. Eventually, however, when the focus of the bank shifted from Africa to other countries, I left the bank."

But apparently his destiny was written with the ink of banking, so how could he leave it? After a few months, it was announced that 15 African countries had come together to create an economic zone called Eco and wanted to create one centralised bank for all - the Ecobank. Yoro

joined the bank and today it is the largest bank in the whole of Africa, with a branch in Dubai that was setup by Yoro himself.

Money isn't a motivator for Yoro. For him, the ultimate objective matters. "In Africa, we're all trying to imitate the west and in doing so, we've lost our identity. We need to change our mindset." In his free time, he likes to study the Holy Quran and likes to take long walks. He has been to Hajj a couple of times and looks forward to going there sometime soon.

In Yoro's opinion, Dubai has really changed and grown over the years. "Back then, you'd land at the airport, see a small hut outside, have two roads that drove you till the Trade Centre and that was Dubai. Look at where the country is today!" He has also been involved with the Expo 2021 right from the start and looks forward to seeing how the long dream of Dubai would manifest in a couple of months.

Yoro wants to live a life of inspiration. "The passage of time is so quick that people don't realise how negligible our existence is. One needs to work towards leaving an impact and Africans really need to start looking at what they have rather than focusing on what they don't.


We're a rich continent only if we start utilizing what we have," he concludes.

Baafi stepped in to not only install the Oracle software in the banks and make their processes better, but he also trained the staff and ensured that everyone was on board with the new digital process. He recalls, "When I went to Ghana, I realized that there was no Oracle expertise in my hometown which inspired me to take matters in my own hand".







As a businessman, he admires the way the Government of UAE functions and wishes that the same processes are followed in Ghana. The dedication and commitment in UAE towards performing each task with strict adherence to rules and principles is what makes it one of the most sought-after countries to do business and settle in.

As per him, every time he visits the country, he is awestruck at the way UAE maintains its

infrastructure, old and new alike. He also admires the way the UAE Government takes initiative to continuously move the country in the direction of growth and innovation which is something he plans to do for his own country one day.

It takes a certain amount of courage and madness to leave a well-paying job and start afresh. Mr Baafi had a bit of both, which is what makes him the man he is. "This was another significant setback in my life, growing up," she shares, "however, I drew inspiration from my dad, who would always admonish, 'Life is not a straight path but meandering'."


"At any point in my life, I was faced with one obstacle or the other, I, literally, would hear these words reverberating in my mind, and the warrior within me, awoken to action," she continues.

## The tale of the Legen-DAIRY

AHMED EL TIGANI ABDUL RAHEEM EL MANSOURI, CEO, Al Rawabi Dairy Company







Born in Khartum, the capital city of Sudan, Dr Ahmed El Tigani has come a long way. Currently, Dr Tigani juggles a number of designations: CEO, business consultant, board director, general manager, lecturer, entrepreneur, along with being a husband and a father. His own father was the chairman of the Farmer's Union as well as an active politician in Sudan. One among sixteen siblings, Ahmed Tigani completed his schooling

in a prominent world-class British school before moving away from his hometown at seventeen. He then completed his PhD in Veterinary Medicine from the University of Zagreb in former-Yugoslavia, before going to Saudi Arabia to teach as a lecturer. Further he pursued his business studies from Wharton Business School, Pennsylvania where he accumulated most of his business and leadership skills from.

His actual journey, however, begins when he arrives into the UAE. Dr Tigani's primary feat is constructing a company from scratch within the span of ten months. "We came to Dubai in June 1989, and by Jan 1991, we were in the market."

He started out with one secretary and an accountant - now he leads a company with 2800 personnel. Today Al Rawabi Dairy Company is internationally acclaimed and has won multiple awards. In-fact, it is the only company selling 13 different kinds of products including dairy, beef, juices etc.

During its initial days, Al Rawabi pioneered the practice of selling milk in plastic bottles, first in half and one litre, and then by 1993, in family sizes of two and three litre bottles. In 2000, Al Rawabi became the first company to introduce functional dairy products into the market. They

worked with a Finnish research team to calculate body requirements between 6 am to 2 pm, to create NutreeBoost - a special formula packed in a 200ml bottle that serves as a complete breakfast replacement. It won the Best Food Product in Balfour and the Best Tasting Food Product in an international food exhibition in Belgium.

In Dr Tigani's opinion, the only secret to success is innovation. "GCC countries only sold long-life drinks until Al Rawabi introduced the sale of fresh juices across the country," added Dr Tigani.

Furthermore, under the leadership of Dr Tigani, the company collaborated with the Ministry of Health to understand deficiencies in diets and started infusing their milk with Vitamin D.

They are the only company in the region till date to do this. Other products of the brand today include SuperMilk and ImmuniBoost with added Zinc, probiotic bacteria, and vitamins D and C, to boost immunity especially post Covid-19.

All of the above paved the path to the success of Al Rawabi. Today the brand is the market leader in UAE, having shares in Oman and Qatar, delivering products to 14800 outlets, through 380 delivery vans.

The achievements of the brand, however, wouldn't have been theirs had Al Rawabi not had a strong team to back it up. Dr Tigani credits his exemplary team for making it big. Hence, he makes sure his employees are well taken care of so they can perform to their best capacity. "Boss or a leader? I am a facilitator," he says. He uses ideas like The Four Disciplines of Execution to help with cross-department project management, which is highly inspiring in its own accord.

He encourages healthy competition among employees and also provides them with regular bonuses despite the pandemic recession. He ensures to take the managers with their families for vacations twice a month because deep inside, Dr Tigani values family time just as must. In-fact he loves spending time with his wife and children, and ensures to take time out for them despite his busy schedules. He also hits the gym in his free time and enjoys going for long walks to rejuvenate himself. On the side, Dr Tigani has also established his own consultancy firm. He a part of the Harvard Business Seminar, a senior leadership programme comprising of 52 international executives where Dr Tigani focuses on Africa.

He believes that "...It is only Africa that can save the world from food scarcity and famine." Africa has currently exploited merely 7% of its resources. With the correct consultancy, investment and business in Africa can fetch profits of 30-40%.

Imad decided that he had to do everything in his capacity to relieve his mother from her mental and physical anguish. Deprived of a normal childhood, Imad had to strive to sustain the everyday lives of his siblings and mother, by contributing to the income for the household. "I never even thought about spending the change I had on things like toys or candies," he recalls.

His innate desire to ease his mother's hardships have helped him drive forward and persevere through life. From giving his final exams in a grocery shop to traveling six hours for a job he didn't like, Imad has been no

stranger to hardship – or hard work. According to him, the struggles he faced have "hardened as well as softened" him, making him work twice as earnestly.

From the small city, he travelled to the capital city of Algiera, to take admission at the University of Algiers within the Institute of Foreign Languages and Translation.

During his childhood, his mother had taught him various household chores, like sewing, cooking, cleaning, and even cutting hair. This gave him an edge over others because he was self-sufficient. already Using his grandmother's old sewing machine, Imad would stitch his own clothes and wear them to university. "My garment was a victory for me," he says because the others thought Imad's homemade clothing was from a prominent brand. This helped him blend in with the wealthier students despite being from a less elite background.

After graduation, a new life began for him. With a new set of skills combined with his other learned abilities, Imad was ready to face challenges and turn them into opportunities.

At which point he was compelled to take up a job loading cartons in Abu Dhabi.

Imad believes that one should: "...never refuse any extra job because it will only take you up. It will make a leader out of you. A leader does not do things, but he knows how things are done." In 2009, he got a job as a translator in a small shop within a fish market in rural Abu Dhabi and that his where the his life took a whole new turn.

Through the years, accomplishing one feat after another, today Imad stands as an inspiration. 



He had been raised by his uncle brother of his dad Yeneneh Eshete and special mother Tenage Mekuria whom he considered his father and mother.

Tatek began to adjust in his new family life, Unforgettable setback came his way. He lost his younger brother Zelalem in a car accident, which till date he considers the biggest scar of his life. "I cannot bring him back, no matter what I do and that's something I haven't been able to recover from till date," he says. However, when the going gets, tough, the tough gets going. Tatek knew that if he spent more time grieving on the loss, he wouldn't be able to support his family which needed him the most. He quickly picked himself up and assumed the position of a leader and helped stabilize his family's situation.

Tatek went on to complete his high school in Ethiopia itself and decided to pursue commerce in college.

It was during this time that he started playing basketball for Olympiacos team and eventually managed to get selected for the Ethiopian Nationals. But that's where his life changed. He realized he had reached the zenith in sports, and that he wanted a stable career to do with something more technical rather than sports or accounts. "You see, in accounting you're calculating numbers all your life for others, not for yourself. I wanted to be on the other side of the table," he explains.

He pursued his studies and became a qualified Electrical/Electronic Technologist and an IT Engineer. While learning he opened his shop called Tata Electronics which became the stepping stone to his success, bringing him much renown and credibility for his IT skills.

After arriving in Dubai in 2010, he joined Safety Consultant IB and 2014 established Future Scale Safety Consultancies Est which performs safety inspections and trainings for the buildings, houses, offices and other residential and commercial places, on behalf of the Government. Eventually, his business grew and he decided to diversify into other sectors.







Finding a lucrative opportunity, in the year 2016, Tatek launched an Events company with multiple branches. "Our main aim here is to invite artists and speakers, give them a platform to showcase their talent and earn," he describes. "But during Covid, we couldn't do much and that's when I decided to step up and launch another firm called TATATECH, an IT company providing all forms of IT products and solutions to customers across the UAE."

He finds the combination of IT and safety very profitable as it allows him to offer a complete solution to his customers wherein he provides the systems and ensures their long term safety. Interestingly, the name Tatatech comes from his younger brother Amanuel who would fondly call him Tata. Tatek rejoices on how he is often mistaken with the Indian business tycoon Tata and ends up getting business because of the shared name.

Beyond work, Tatek is a dotting family man.
